Dr. Jim Buckner, trumpet

A native of Iowa, Jim Buckner holds degrees from Iowa State University, University of Michigan, and a DM in trumpet performance from Northwestern University. He has formerly taught at Illinois State University, Quincy University, Western Carolina University, and Truman State University. Dr. Jim Buckner has been a member of the Quincy Symphony, Asheville Symphony, Brevard Chamber Orchestra, and the Smoky Mountain Brass Band. Currently, Dr. Jim Buckner is the principal trumpet in the South Arkansas Symphony and Professor of Music at Henderson State University.

Mr. John Webb, trumpet

John Webb is a native of Arkansas and holds degrees from Henderson State University. He is currently the band director at Benton High School, Benton, AR, and has served as President of the Arkansas Bandmasters Association. Last year he was named Arkansas Bandmaster of the Year. John Webb has been a member of the Miss Arkansas Orchestra for thirteen years and has played in bands for many touring performers such as Sammy Davis, Jr., James Brown, and Phyllis Diller. John Webb is currently second trumpet in the South Arkansas Symphony.

Dr. Jim Woolly, horn

Jim Woolly is a native of Little Rock and holds degrees from the University of Arkansas and a Ph.D from the University of Southern Mississippi. An outstanding soloist and clinician, Jim Woolly has done successful work in junior high and college teaching. He is the horn professor at Henderson State University. Jim Woolly has been a member of the North Arkansas Symphony, Arkansas Symphony, Meridian, MS Symphony, and the Gulf Coast Symphony. He has served as principal horn for the Pensacola Symphony, Oak Ridge Symphony, and is currently principal horn for the South Arkansas Symphony and regularly performs with the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra. He is also a member of the International Horn Society.

Dr. Wes Branstine, trombone

A native of Broken Bow, OK, Wes Branstine holds degrees from Henderson State University and a Masters and DMA from North Texas State University. An outstanding soloist, brass clinician, and band clinician, he has had a successful career teaching in junior high, senior high, and college. Currently, Dr. Wes Branstine is Professor of Music at Henderson State University. He is also a member of the International Trombone Association.

Mr. Chris Kornegay, tuba

A native of El Dorado, AR, Chris Kornegay holds degrees from Henderson State University and North Texas University. Besides being an outstanding soloist and clinician, he is a band director at Paris I.S.D., TX, and principal tubist in the South Arkansas Symphony. Chris Kornegay is also a member of the Tubist Universal Brotherhood Association – TUBA.

SPECIAL CLINICS

DR. JACK COOPER offers a wide range of experience as a performer, composer, and educator. As a saxophone/woodwind performer and staff arranger, Dr. Cooper served from 1989-1995 with the U. S. Army "Jazz Knights" performing, recording, and touring. As a woodwind doubler, he has performed with Manhattan Transfer, The Temptations, The Lettermen, Sheri Lewis, Kenny Rogers, Bob Newhart and Smokey Robinson as well as many other entertainers. Jack Cooper is musical director and founder of the Jazz Orchestra of the Delta, a professional jazz orchestra that performs across the mid-south. Dr. Cooper is the recipient of ASCAP, NEA, and Meet The Composer Grants. He joined the University of Memphis as a faculty member in 1998 where he conducts the Southern Comfort Jazz Orchestra and teaches jazz improvisation, jazz arranging, jazz pedagogy, and graduate jazz analysis.


VINCE DIMARTINO, one of America's leading trumpet performers and teachers, is the W. George Matton Professor of Music at Centre College in Danville, Kentucky. DiMartino has performed worldwide as a soloist and with artists such as Henry Mancini, Doc Severinsen, Pearl Bailey, Dizzy Gillespie and Dave Brubeck. Widely admired for classical and jazz playing, he has also in recent years begun to specialize in virtuoso comet solos. DiMartino is a popular performer at the Great American Brass Band Festival, which annually draws 40,000 people to Danville for outstanding brass music. A graduate of the Eastman School of Music (bachelor's and master's degrees), he has performed as a soloist with many symphony orchestras, and is prominently featured in many recordings of the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. Doc Severinson commented for a news story: "Vince is not only beloved but highly respected by trumpet players the world over, myself among them. He's a very inspirational person who's used to working with young musicians and he always lights a fire."

HENDERSON STATE UNIVERSITY BRASS BAND originated four years ago as a combination of brass instruments including Eb soprano comets, fluegelhonrs, alto homs, tenor homs and all low brass and percussion instruments. The group is patterned after the modem British brass bands. Their program will include music by Elgar, Bizet, Saint-Saens, and Curnow. Featured as guest soloists will be Dr. James Buckner, HSU and John Webb, Benton Senior High. Their conductor is Dr. Wes Branstine, professor of low brass at HSU.

KATHY BOWEN is a widely recognized expert on elementary music teaching methods and curriculum design. She will share ways to incorporate the state curriculum into your teaching situation, and give you many innovative activities to add excitement to your classes. Her clinics are sponsored by Arkansas Elementary Music Educators Association.

TIMOTHY SALZMAN is Professor of Music at the University of Washington where he serves as a conductor of the University Wind Ensemble and Concert Band, and teaches students enrolled in the graduate conducting program. Prior to his appointment at the UW he served as Director of Bands at Montana State University where he founded the MSU Wind Ensemble. Professor Salzman holds degrees from Wheaton (IL) College (BME) and Northern Illinois University (MM in low brass performance), and has studied privately with Arnold Jacob, former tubist of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He has numberous publications for bands with the C. L. Barnhouse, Arrangers Publications, Columbia Pictures and Hal Leonard publishing companies, and has served on the staff of new music reviews for the Instrumentalist magazine. Mr. Salzman is a national artist/clinician for the Yamaha Corporation of America and has been a conductor, adjudicator or arranger for bands in over thirty states, Canada, England, Japan, South Korea and Russia. Tim Salzman will be conducting the Arkansas Intercollegiate Band on Thursday evening. His clinic is sponsored by the Arkansas Chapter of College Band Directors National Association.

THE F. M. ALEXANDER TECHNIQUE is a systematic method for improving ease and freedom of movement, flexibility, and coordination in musicians of all ability levels—beginner to professional. Musicians studying the Technique learn to identify and change those habits of thought and movement that create tension and strain in playing, singing, and conducting. Applying the principles of the Technique enhances musical performance at all levels and is a valued tool for performers and music educators. Carole Herrick is a certified teaching member of Alexander Technique International.




