

Paul Dukas (1865-1935)

In seventy years of life, Paul Dukas left behind only seven major compositions and five minor works. This was not because Dukas was a slow worker or lazy; instead, Dukas was one of the most self-critical composers in history, destroying or hiding many of his works which he felt to be unworthy. A student of Théodore Dubois at the Paris Conservatoire, Dukas' first surviving work of note was his Symphony (1896). This was followed by his best-known work, L'apprenti sorcier ("The Sorcerer's Apprentice"), based on Goethe's poem "Der Zauberlehrling." His last complete work was the ballet La Peri, at the age of 47, after which he retired from composing and began his career as a teacher of composition and a music critic.

### Mutations from Bach

Samuel Barber (1910-1981)

### Mr. Jesse Leyva, conductor

Mutations from Bach is a short sequence of transformations of the plain-song, Christe, du Lamm Gottes (Christ, Thou Lamb of God). It is first heard as harmonized by Joachim Decker (1604) from the beginning until the end of m.6. At the first key and meter change (4/2, m.7), it is then heard in the harmonization of J.S. Bach from Cantata, no. 23. At the next meter change (3/2), the plain-song is heard in canon at the twelfth which is similar to the Choral Prelude no. 21 from Bach's Orgelbuchlein. The final nineteen measures set the plain-song in the recitative section in Ach, gehe nicht voruber, from Bach's Cantata, no. 23. This is followed by a restatement of the old version of the chorale in the final five measures, which concludes the work.

Ross' Euphonium Concerto was commissioned by Kennesaw College in Georgia and was intended to be performed by a professional soloist and an ensemble of younger performers. The first movement opens with a dramatic introduction followed by a cadenza in the solo instrument. The principal idea is then heard in the euphonium, and the movement continues in a series of episodes and developments of the main idea. The second movement is a theme and three variations on the old hymn, "Der Alte Jahr Vergangen ist". The last movement is a scherzo, so called because of the humorous interplay between the rhythm and the meter.

Symphony for Brass and Percussion Largo Con moto

Alfred Reed (1921-2005)

The Symphony for Brass and Percussion was premiered in 1952 and two of the three contrasting movements will be performed on this concert. The second movement is a three part song form - the first part opens with the thematic material in the lower voices, part two is a brief fugue, followed by a return to the opening material in part three. The final movement is in rondo form and is based on Latin-American rhythms. Reed combines intricate rhythmic figures with ostinato and pedal point treatment in the lower voices. The movement concludes with a brief coda featuring the main theme of the first movement in rhythmically augmented form.

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### Alfred Reed (1921-2005)

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**Dr. Jim Buckner** has been principal trumpeter in the South Arkansas Symphony Orchestra since the fall of 1990. He has also performed as first trumpeter with the Arkansas Symphony, the Quincy (iL) Symphony, the Brevard (NC) Chamber Orchestra and has been a member of the Asheville (NC) and the Waterloo-Cedar Falls (IA) Symphonies. He has been soloist with the South Arkansas Symphony, the Illinois Wesleyan University Chamber Orchestra, the Quincy Symphony, the Brevard Chamber Orchestra, and the Iowa State University Symphony.

In September 1995 Buckner performed a recital in Glinka Hall at the Moscow International Trumpet Festival. He has been featured with school, university, and community bands, brass bands, and jazz bands throughout the South and Midwest, including a performance with the Smoky Mountain British Brass Band in 1982 at the 1982 World's Fair in Knoxville, Tennessee.

A member of the Arkansas Brass quintet for seventeen years, Buckner has performed in brass quintets, brass choirs, and brass bands for over thirty-five years. He has played in a number of jazz bands and combos and played first trumpet in the musicals *Titanic*, *Peter Pan* (with Cathy Rigby), *Anything Goes, Mame*, and *West Side Story*.

Buckner is Chair of the Department of Music and Professor of Trumpet at Henderson State University where he teaches trumpet and brass methods and conducts brass ensembles; he was the recipient of the Faculty Excellence Award in Teaching in 2001. Buckner was previously a faculty member at Illinois State University, Quincy University, Western Carolina University, and Truman State University.

He received the Bachelor of Music in Instrumental Music Education from Iowa State University, the Master of Music in Trumpet Performance from the University of Michigan, and the Doctor of Music in Trumpet Performance from Northwestern University. He has also studied with Arnold Jacobs (Chicago Symphony), Vincent Cichowicz (Chicago Symphony), and Susan Slaughter (St. Louis Symphony).


