#### Program Notes

Composed in three weeks during the summer of 1741, *Messiah* was George Frideric Handel's (1685-1759) ninth oratorio. Unlike the typical Handel oratorio, none of the soloists portray a character in this work. The "Messiah" is not quoted and does not take an active role. There is no mention of a stable, star, cross or tomb. But with the biblical text, compiled by the librettist Charles Jennens and Handel's music it celebrates the prophecy, birth, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The 56 documented performances of *Messiah* during the composer's life left no definitive version of the score. He altered the score many times transcribing alto airs for counter-tenor or bass soloists and adjusting instrumental parts to balance the chorus. Handel's approach to *Messiah* was essentially practical, revising and adapting according to the availability of certain solo singers and the special circumstances of a given performance. Most modern editions of the score combine elements of all available manuscripts to create a scholarly edition that attempts to be true to the composer's intent.

Our approach to "Messiah" is practical as well. We have chosen recitatives, aria and choruses appropriate for the student performer and that reflect the sparkling Baroque style of Handel. We have also chosen those choruses and airs with texts related to the prophecy and birth of Christ. The performers this evening will present part one and the chorus "Hallelujah" from part two. It is referred to by many as the "Christmas" portion of the work.

The first performance in Dublin on April 13, 1742 received great acclaim. Despite this success, *Messiah* did not achieve popularity in London until 1750 when London's Foundling Hospital sponsored a performance as a benefit concert which became an annual event. The April 1759 performance of this annual concert was the last conducting appearance of the composer before his death.

Handel's original performing forces for *Messiah* consisted of 32 singers (16 boys and 16 men) and 32 instrumentalists. Later performances documented the use of 6 boys and 12 or 13 men. It was a common practice to use boy sopranos and male altos (counter-tenors) to sing the treble parts. Another typical performance practice was for soloists to sing the choruses. Handel employed between five and nine soloists for a given performance.

As *Messiah* gained more popularity, performances included larger orchestras and choirs. In 1784, at a Handel Commemoration in Westminster Abbey, a performance of *Messiah* included 525 singers and instrumentalists. In the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century, performing forces grew into the thousands. In 1923 a documented performance included four thousand singers. Performances of the last thirty years have returned to smaller performing forces. This trend is based on a greater understanding of baroque performance practice and the music of Handel through extensive musicological research. Despite the many modifications and performing trends, *Messiah* has become one of the most cherished oratorios in the repertoire. It is routinely performed for Christmas and Easter celebrations around the world.
